ILEA HEADQUARTERS DRIVING DIRECTIONS

From DFW Airport: Take the North Airport exit. Take 121 North and go approximately 18.5 miles to Legacy Drive. Turn right on Legacy Drive and go 1.5 miles to Parkwood Blvd. Turn right on Parkwood Blvd. and go .4 mile to Tennyson Parkway. Turn left on Tennyson Parkway and go .5 mile to Democracy Drive. We are on the right, on the corner of Democracy Drive and Tennyson Parkway.

From Downtown Dallas: Go north on the Dallas North Tollway. Take the Spring Creek Parkway/Dallas North Tollway frontage road. Go through the first stop light and turn right at the next stop light (Tennyson Parkway). Proceed east on Tennyson for .7 mile, and we are on the right, at the corner of Tennyson Parkway and Democracy Drive.

Over the past several decades, police agencies expanded the array of services through specialized teams focused on specific citizen groups. No longer is policing simply patrol and investigation. These specialized units have expended and now constitute a major part of police delivery of services to the community. Common to many departments are units such as school liaison, gang, violent crime, domestic violence, elderly abuse and mentally ill specialties that augment traditional ones such as crime prevention, SWAT and K-9 units. The existence of such diverse functions is a challenge to management. Although patrol operations continue to be the largest service, more and more the management of special functions assumes a greater role. This conference is designed to focus on recent innovations and the role of supervision and management.

WILLIAM J. BRATTON, appointed the 54th Chief of the Los Angeles Police Department. Chief Bratton's vision includes a comprehensive and assertive strategy for dramatically reducing crime, disorder and fear. Chief Bratton holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Law Enforcement from Boston

State College/University of Massachusetts. He is a graduate of the FBI National Executive Institute and was a Senior Executive Fellow at Harvard University's John F. Kennedy School of Government, where he served as a Research Fellow. During the period from 1993 to 1996, he served as the elected president of the Police Executive Research Forum (PERF), a national police research and policy organization whose members include some of the most progressive police leaders in North America.

A frequent guest lecturer, writer and commentator, he is the co-author of his critically acclaimed Random House autobiography "Turnaround." Among his many other honors and awards, Chief Bratton holds the Schroeder Brother's Medal, which is the Boston Police Department's highest award for valor.
