Barry McNeil began his career in Little Rock Arkansas where he represented Arkansas residents seeking to assert their constitutional rights in housing and public assistance. From Arkansas, he moved to Washington D.C. as a federal antitrust prosecutor. Now he practices with Haynes and Boone, where he has successfully represented clients in numerous jury trials, involving allegations of civil and criminal fraud.

Public and private companies when faced with claims of misconduct often call upon the talent and experience of Barry, co-editor of the widely published handbook, *Internal Corporate Investigations*.

Barry looks to his representation of Alberto Sifuentes and Jesus Ramirez as his proudest professional moment. The two indigent Mexican nationals were wrongly convicted and sentenced to life for a murder they did not commit. In their seventh year of representing the two men, Barry and his team secured the release of Mr. Ramirez and Mr. Sifuentes after three weeks of trial. Barry has a longtime association with CAIL where he has served on its Board of Trustees and as Chair of its Executive Committee. He is also a member of the American College of Trial Lawyers and a former Chair of the Litigation Section of the ABA. He teaches White Collar Crime and Policy at both the University of Texas School of Law and Southern Methodist University School of Law.
