International Commercial Arbitration combines demonstration scenes with expert commentaries to illuminate the ordinarily private world of international arbitration. Sit in at the parties' confidential strategy meetings and at closed arbitration hearings. Watch an international panel of arbitrators discuss and decide the issues. Then listen to international experts explain the issues raised in the mock scenes.





Each DVD includes 5 hours of mock scenes and commentaries, a Study Guide by Prof. Caron and supplemental written materials. The mock scenes and commentaries were originally presented live at the annual Workshop of the Institute for Transnational Arbitration and later edited for educational use by professors, firms and individual attorneys seeking to teach or understand this growing area of international practice.

#### Excerpts from the Study Guide to Part 3 by Prof. David D. Caron:

A major purpose of the Institute's initiative in making these DVD's is to provide professors with audiovisual materials to use in the classroom.

I teach a seminar entitled "Resolution of Private International Disputes", where I use portions of these videotapes approximately two-thirds of the way through the course. Unlike my usual fifty-minute classroom sections, I schedule a full two, or even three, hour session to view the videotapes.

My approach is to provide the background for a scene, play that scene, and then open up the discussion. We often watch three or four scenes over the course of one session. For students who wish to see more parts of the mock arbitration or listen to the commentaries on Tape 2, the videotapes are available in the library for private viewing. In some years, student response has been so positive that we have scheduled a second session to view more of the mock arbitration.

Although the substantive issues addressed in the mock arbitration drive the selection of scenes that I use, the educational value of the tapes go substantially beyond the particular topic addressed. Students notice a variety of issues while watching the arbitration, including the various lawyering styles and the attorneys' behavior under pressure. Students are fascinated with seeing an arbitration, even if obviously "mock". Therefore, I suggest you take a moment to review the biographies of the various actors involved, as this can be a useful discussion point for new attorneys. It is important to realize that students focus not only on the substantive issues involved in a case, but also on how the attorneys "lawyer" and the judges judge.
